Kids across the United States and now in our first school in Canada are experiencing the thrill of releasing their first arrow, catching their first fish, and learning about the importance of wildlife conservation because of their Outdoor Adventures class. Amid these inspiring moments, a significant number of Outdoor Adventures students are earning their hunter education and boating safety certifications.

It is exciting to share that more than 1,300 public and private elementary, middle, and high schools, as well as a few colleges, now offer the premier in-school outdoor education curriculum. This year, thanks to the strong support of the outdoor industry and private donors, Outdoor Adventures now reaches 130,000+ students annually. The expansion into new schools and the continuous enhancement of our programs represent significant milestones, and I extend my deepest gratitude to our dedicated staff, board, and volunteers for making this possible.

One key to the recent growth of Outdoor Adventures is the introduction of the elementary curriculum in 2023. Previously the curriculum was only available to middle and high schools, but now there are specific units designed and accredited for elementary school, including fishing and wildlife conservation. As the program has grown, the need for more teacher training became apparent and in response, we are building an in-person professional development program led by 15 regional trainers and complemented by a video-based training series.

Outdoor Adventures is driven forward by the incredible support from conservation organizations and companies within the outdoor industry. Through our Partnership Initiative program, we've fostered collaborations that not only support our curriculum but also extend the reach of our program via sponsorships, social media, and chapter systems, connecting students with opportunities beyond the classroom.

Our progress, sustained by the generosity of our donors and the engagement of our community—including teachers, state wildlife agencies, and conservation partners—is a source of immense pride and gratitude. It's my hope that as you turn these pages, you feel inspired and proud of the impact we're making together in bringing more children into the outdoors.

THE FUTURE OF OUTDOOR EDUCATION

Outdoor Adventures has unlimited potential growth, with 130,930 public and private elementary and secondary schools in the United States (2018 National Center for Education Statistics). Work is also underway to eventually expand Outdoor Adventures internationally.

The OTF is building the infrastructure needed to accelerate growth and get more kids connected with the outdoors. This includes an e-commerce system, improved equipment delivery, and development of a teacher training program.

Additionally, we have worked to develop partnerships with conservation organizations that are willing to help fund schools locally such as the Georgia Chapter of SCI and the New Mexico Chapter of the DSC. Because of the support of these chapters we are able to offer schools a grant to help offset the cost of the equipment packages.

Because of the growth Outdoor Adventures has had in large urban areas, the need for more teacher training became apparent and we have increased our in-person and video teacher training options, creating both another revenue stream, and improving the quality of the program.





Outdoor Adventures Now in Elementary Schools

The 2022-23 school year was a landmark year for Outdoor Adventures as the elementary version of the curriculum was introduced.

Offering outdoor skills-based education to kindergarten through 5th grade students ensures a well-rounded, interactive, and all-inclusive physical education program. Students learn real life skills that will last a lifetime and have the power to impact the family and community.

Research supports improvement in the overall health and well-being of a child when outdoor natural environments and free play are incorporated into education. Additionally, research also shows that the earlier kids are introduced to the outdoors, the more likely they are to continue outdoor recreation.

The Outdoors Tomorrow Foundation's elementary Outdoor Adventures program embraces the whole child and fosters a love and appreciation for nature and wildlife education.













Every year OTF presents the Outdoor Adventures Educator of the Year award, and in 2023 the award was presented to Mary Driemeyer who teaches at Sappington Elementary School in St. Louis, Missouri.

Mary has been teaching physical education for nearly 30 years, including archery through the Missouri Department of Conservation. Three years ago, she discovered Outdoor Adventures and now includes paddle sports, camping, survival skills, angling, orienteering, wildlife conservation, and more in her classes.

Outdoor Adventures has been a hit at Sappington Elementary with numerous families thanking Driemeyer for teaching the unique class. Mary explains why she values OA, "When I teach OA it engages EVERYONE. It is rare to find subject matter that engages 100% of the students. They love the outdoor elements, novel subject matter, tie-in with nature and wildlife, the unique challenges, the deeper discussions and real life application. The special connection is with students who are not as interested in traditional sports and PE subject matter. It is very rewarding to see them find a passion that can keep them active and outdoors."

Teamwork and responsibility are two important values that students learn through the OA lesson, Driemeyer elaborated. "In the conservation lessons students learn that everyone plays a role in taking care of our wildlife."

While Mary played outside a lot as a child, she had never learned to hunt, fish, camp or enjoy paddle sports until she started teaching Outdoor Adventures. Now she spends many weekends enjoying the beauty of Missouri's state parks while kayaking, paddleboarding, or hiking. "Not only has teaching OA had an impact on my students, it has had a HUGE impact on my lifestyle," Driemeyer commented.




